About Coram

Coram is the UK children's charity that has been supporting vulnerable children for more than 275 years and is still finding new ways to help children. Coram helps children and young people develop their skills and emotional health, finds adoptive parents and upholds children's rights; creating a change that lasts a lifetime. We now help a million children and young people every year and comprise a continuing narrative as the oldest children's charity and birthplace of children's social care.

About Voices through Time: The Story of Care

Voices through Time: The Story of Care is a National Lottery Heritage funded project to digitise Coram's Foundling Hospital archive, and make it available to a wide audience online, so people can learn about its history and that of children in care over time. These archive records are being transcribed through a crowd-sourcing volunteer transcription project.

The project is also delivering a series of creative projects with young people with lived experience of the care system. Using the archive as inspiration, young people will create films, exhibitions, theatre and other creative outputs, talking about their own experiences, and sharing these with the general public, in an effort to change attitudes about care-experienced young people.





Purpose of the Role:

To research and uncover the stories of former pupils at the historic Foundling Hospital from the 1730s to the early 20th Century, using primary source documents from our archive, located at the London Metropolitan Archives.

To support the Archivist, Archive Engagement Intern and Social Historian in providing these source archive materials for the *Voices Through Time* programme, focusing on the lives of former Foundling Hospital pupils.

Coram recognises the value that our volunteers bring to the organisation and seeks to create volunteering opportunities that are meaningful, well-supported and mutually beneficial.

Main Duties & Responsibilities:

With the programme Archivist and the Archive Intern:

- Become familiar with the Foundling Hospital archive.
- Identify records in the archive / digitised records which can tell the story of the life of former pupils at the Foundling Hospital.

Individually:

- Learn about the Foundling Hospital through reading, research, visiting the London Metropolitan Archive, and viewing the digitised archive records.
- Research the story of individuals, using the archival documents and other public records.
- Present stories of Foundlings to young people participating in our creative project Feature Foundlings.
- Share the stories of Foundling pupils in a regular article / blog piece about a "Feature Foundling".
- Share about your experience of volunteering on social media and on the Coramstory website.
- Share your research findings with other volunteers on the project, e.g. Transcribers, Ambassadors.
- Help the Voices Through Time team to organise events related to the archive.
- Encourage and engage in discussion about the records in the transcription project message board.

Person Specification

- A demonstrable interest in archives, heritage and/or social history from 1730 onwards.
- A passion for history and an interest in the history of the Foundling Hospital.
- A respect for archive materials, and an understanding of their sometimes fragile nature.
- An enthusiasm for telling the stories of young people.
- Excellent writing skills.
- Confidence; good interpersonal skills; an ability to communicate openly; and a proven ability to work well in a team.
- Good organisational and administrative skills; an ability to meet deadlines and maintain records.
- Good general computer literacy.

Desirable

- Experience of research in history or the social sciences.
- Experience of engaging on creative projects.
