
Meticulous records ensured that the journey of every child was captured - their care, their education, their apprenticeships. New names were given to those who needed a new beginning.


The Foundling Hospital now known as Coram was established in 1739 to support babies whose mother's circumstances left them unable to care for them. The modern care system started in this place as

a result of the pioneering vision of Thomas Coram.





The shelves of these records are longer than two football pitches and contain thousands of petitions left by desperate mothers seeking a place for their child.

Fabric tokens of cloth and ribbon- one half left at the Hospital, one half taken away by mothers, in case they were able to return to reclaim their child form one of the largest collections of textiles from this era in the world.

And now 100,000 records - 23% of the archive - have been digitised for others to discover.

Care-experienced young people today have explored this history, and created their own echoes through time to help drive positive change for the future.
